From The Rectory ...

With the Annual Parochial Church Meetings (APCMs) within the benefice now taking place, I thought I would share with you my report for 2023, as presented to the churches within the benefice.

At the APCMs which each church holds, annual reporting is shared, accounts approved, new members and officers are elected and questions may be asked of the church's ministry. Here is my report in full....

I write my report for 2023 as Rector of the benefice, rather than Priest-in-Charge, Rector being a title that I was proud to have recently accepted but, more importantly, a title that has been given due to the work and ministry that has taken place in Mid-Loes during the past year, which I can assure you, is down to the commitment and love of the people of our churches and communities, within the benefice.

Whilst I must firstly acknowledge the tireless efforts of the PCCs across the eight churches within our benefice, without whom we would struggle to keep our churches open and available for the various services that take place each week, I feel it is also important to use the word 'communities' because there are many people who would consider themselves to be 'non-church' who contribute to the life of our churches in varying ways. From flower arrangers; to the grass-cutters who keep our churchyards in good order; to those who clean our churches; to those who help at the various church events that take place regularly across the benefice; to the many people who contribute to church life as self-proclaimed 'non-church' people... thank you for all that you have contributed during 2023, and continue to do so as we move deeper into 2024.

I was delighted to present the '5-Year Plan for Growth' initiative that was put together after a series of Listening Events and various discussions from which three key areas were identified as important to our ministry going forward. The three key areas were:

Depth – more opportunities for Bible Study and Prayer

Influence – continued ministry through pastoral support across the benefice

Younger – a review of ministry to younger people and families.

The Ministry Team will focus on these key areas, working through established service patterns and styles, as well as bringing new ideas and creativity to our worship and events over the coming months and years.

Two areas that have already begun to grow out of the Plan for Growth 5-Year Plan is a monthly Home Communion Service, and a Bible Study Group.

The Home Communion Service takes place at Firs Farm and is led by Revd Kathleen. Whilst a simple service of Communion and a light lunch, the attendance at this service indicates the importance of serving people where they are, something that enables church to be present and available 7 days a week, something that is important in the ever-changing society in which we live.

The Bible Study Group has continued from a 6-week course, based on the Pilgrim series of study books from the Church of England. Whilst the Monday group is at capacity, there is room for more people to join the Tuesday afternoon group, which provides a safe, trusting, opportunity for people exploring their personal faith, through to people who wish to explore different aspects of their faith. Please let me know if meeting on a Tuesday afternoon might work for you.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank the Ministry Team, Revd Kathleen, Revd Wendy, Amber, and Mary, for their continued presence throughout the benefice serving alongside myself and the eight parishes within the benefice. I am very grateful for their presence and support, as I know many, many, people are also very grateful for all that they do.

Whilst I am thanking people, (and I am sure I will miss someone!), I would also like to thank the benefice organists who make such an important contribution to our services, and in turn, thank you to the growing Benefice Choir, who may only come together at our benefice services, but again, a group of people who enhance our worship, and bring real joy to our services.

This year saw the start of an important outreach opportunity for the benefice, and that was establishing all the benefice churches as donation points for the charity, FIND (Families in Need), based in Ipswich. FIND is a charity focussing on the provision of free food parcels and personal care items to help people get through a crisis, as well as furniture, bedding and other household items where the person or family has none. I must thank every single person/family who has contributed to this cause. I can assure you that the donations taken to the FIND offices each month, are gratefully received, and demonstrate the generosity shown by all the parishes within the benefice. The churches will remain as donation points, so please, if you are able and willing, please keep the donations coming....you are making a difference to peoples' lives.

With the thought of bringing the benefice churches together for an annual event, this year saw the first Vicar's Tea Party, held at The Rectory. The idea behind the event was to raise funds for mission and outreach for the benefice; raising funds for a local charity; as well as bringing the benefice churches working together. The event proved to be a great success, with each church represented on the day, as well as £600 being raised for EACH (East Anglia's Children's Hospices). A wonderful afternoon was enjoyed by the many people, where music, food and drink was a plenty, as well as many activities for the whole family to take part in, but most of all, an afternoon of friendship, fun and laughter, was enjoyed by everyone. The date of the Vicar's Tea Party 2024 has been set as Saturday 6th July, with more information to follow.

The Vicar's Tea Party was just one of many events that took place during 2023 across the benefice. From Saturday Morning Café to Afternoon Tea; from Race Nights to Beetle Drives; Harvest Suppers; Burns Night; Village Fetes; Open Gardens; all the events proved to be a vital outreach for our churches in not just raising funds for our churches, but bringing communities together, with church remaining at the centre of each event that takes place. Every event continues to be a success on all levels, so thank you to everyone who contributes to their ongoing success.

I was challenged this year with some correspondence about the validity of church today, especially within our villages, with one direct quote of, 'the majority of local people do not identify as Christian let alone church goers', a challenge that is well documented through the benefice magazine, but a challenge that I was not going to ignore.

2023 has been a wonderful year for our churches and proved this challenge to be wrong. The commitment and love shown by all of our churches has been incredible and continues to be so. It is not just about the many events that have taken place during the year, bringing communities together, but it is also the quiet, untold pastoral work and support that is shown through our churches supporting our communities. It is about the many people who quietly demonstrate Christian values through the loving of their neighbours. It is about the increased numbers of people attending the principal services during the year. Numbers of people attending Mothering Sunday and Harvest services were higher than the previous year, with Easter and Christmas showing increased numbers of people attending services across the benefice. I am also delighted that five weddings have been confirmed for 2024, with two further awaiting dates to be confirmed. All this proves to me that our churches are alive and, in the context of where our churches are set, and with the demographics of our parishes, it is fair to say that the Benefice of Mid-Loes is doing well, and will continue to do so.

Going back to the beginning of this report talking about my being made Rector... a title that has been given due to the work and ministry that has taken place in Mid-Loes during the past year, this in itself is testament to the fact that we are a benefice of churches sharing the love of God within our community, through our ministry and service, supporting ALL through life's joys and sorrows.

MANAGEMENT OF THE CHURCHYARD AT ST.PETER'S CHARSFIELD

Churchyards provide increasingly rare areas of native grassland where pesticides and fertilisers have not been used routinely.

Therefore, churchyards can be a very important for wildlife providing a refuge for a wide range of wildflowers, birds, animals and invertebrates. With sensitive management this wildlife can be encouraged safeguarding this valuable habitat to be enjoyed by parishioners and visitors.

Some of the areas of the churchyard are now being managed for wildlife while paths and areas around the more regularly visited graves are being cut to allow access.

Flower rich grassland needs to be cut to maintain floral diversity but cutting needs to be timed to allow the grasses and other species to flower and set seed. Sometimes this will mean cutting in July and sometimes later in September.

It is important to rake off and remove clippings which need to be left to dry for a few days to allow flowers to shed any ripe seed and insects to escape. Cut vegetation is then piled up in corners to provide useful habitat for creatures such as hedgehogs and slowworms.

In summary we now have areas where wildflowers and wildlife can flourish and already this year, we have seen a proliferation of cowslips and bluebells and hope to see pyramid orchids and scabious again later this year as well as lots of bees and butterflies. We also have cut paths and areas around graves to provide access.

We must wholeheartedly thank the small team who are helping to maintain and manage the churchyard with wildlife in mind. If you feel you would like to help, one of the most labour-intensive jobs is raking the long grass cuttings after they have dried.

Any help with this this would be much appreciated. Watch out for a village email which will tell you when help is needed.


FLAGPOLE AT ST. PETER'S CHARSFIELD



I can't imagine there are many MPs, regardless of party affiliation, who would be willing to claim that mental health policy in the United Kingdom needs no reform. It's an undeniably complex, emotive topic which has for decades challenged Governments, and last month, a full year after I published a report together with other MPs into how the mental health system could be improved, the Government gave their response.

As a practicing NHS consultant psychiatrist here in Suffolk, who has served on committees holding the government to account over this issue, I have long stated publicly that our mental health laws need to be updated.

A glance at the Mental Health Act 1983, which as its title suggests is now over 40 years old, highlights some of the challenges we face. Given the big changes during those decades, not to mention the societal shifts in attitudes to mental health over the same period, it is plain for all to see that mental health legislation is in urgent need of modernisation.

It was with great optimism in 2022 that I joined the Joint House of Commons and House of Lords Committee on the Draft Mental Health Bill, established to unite parliamentarians with relevant expertise to investigate how much-needed changes to mental health lawmaking could be shaped and implemented.

The process was collaborative and gathered evidence from a wide array of clinical experts alongside individuals and organisations operating throughout the healthcare sector. Once all information was collated and absorbed, the committee published its proposals in pursuit of wide-reaching alterations that were only ever intended to be a starting point for continued updates in the years ahead.

The motivation behind this was never ideological; it has always been rooted in the fact that patients are too often denied the standard of care they deserve, in addition to the recognition of long-running inequalities woven into an outdated policy framework.

Among the committee's key recommendations were measures to address the unfairness experienced in the mental health care system by certain groups in our communities.

For example, we need to understand why Black people are four times more likely to be detained under the Mental Health Act than white people, and 11 times more likely to be given a community treatment order.

It is unacceptable that currently, too many autistic people and those with learning disabilities are detained in inappropriate mental health facilities and for excessively long periods of time.

Our committee also sought to introduce amendments to existing legislation to improve patient choices regarding their care and to safeguard individuals from criminalisation as a result of a severe mental illness.

When considering the timing of this review, it is important to note that the urgency with which legislative advancements are required has ramped up significantly since the Covid-19 pandemic.

The number of children and young people experiencing mental distress since the lockdowns earlier this decade is a particular cause for concern, especially when this can mean they end up on adult wards or in hospitals far from home due to the lack of appropriate care placements.

What our committee called for was extensive, urgent modernisation. 55 recommendations were put forward for government consideration and the responses to each and every proposal have now been returned. What was delivered – nothing of substance to date – has, in truth, left me very disappointed.

What I worry about is the idea that some recommendations may now end up debated again for months and years ahead, when we as a nation do not have the luxury of time to mull over these critical issues.

It is not just time being wasted. Government projections suggest mental health expenditure this year will be around £14.8 billion. As people working in or using any part of the NHS will tell you, throwing money at the health service will not instantly solve its problems and we need to reform and transform the services that we deliver to patients.

Ensuring public money is spent wisely is always of paramount importance in delivering our public services, especially in healthcare. Fundamentals of this have to be the consistent, unbiased prioritisation of patient care and a commitment to taking onboard feedback from experts in their field regarding how to shape future policy.

While I fear a partial acceptance of our committee's recommendations, without meaningful delivery of proposed reforms, represents an opportunity missed for this government to achieve something truly transformative on mental health.

Nevertheless, it is undoubtedly most distressing for those requiring mental health care right now who are all too often contending with a system which needs to modernise and transform its care for patients.



Food Donations across the Benefice

The benefice churches are delighted to be supporting FIND (Families in Need) a local charity based in Ipswich supporting people across the local villages and towns.

For over 30 years, Families in Need (FIND) Ipswich, has offered a lifeline to people in Ipswich and the surrounding areas who are experiencing poverty and despair.

FIND provides free food parcels and personal care items to help people get through a crisis, as well as furniture, bedding and other household items where the person or family has none.

An army of over 80 volunteers regularly give their time freely to check and sort the donated food, collect items from local stores, make up the food parcels and deliver them.

It's a six-day a week operation.

The demand for food parcels has risen year on year and FIND now distributes an average of 120-150 parcels every week and even more at Christmas - more than 7,000 every year.

Going Forward

Each church within the benefice has now become a donation point where there are boxes in the church porches in which donations can be left. The donations will then be collected on a regular basis and taken to the offices of FIND. Currently, the food requirements are as follows:

> Long grain rice - Long-life whole milk Toiletries for men, women and children Tinned vegetables, meat, fruit/desserts Coffee - Sugar - Jam - Soup Pet food (dog, cat, fish, rabbit/guinea pig)
